MEET OUR VISITORS



Guernsey Football Club was formed in 2011 to offer the island's elite footballers the opportunity to progress and test themselves on a regular basis outside of the Channel Islands. The proposal to establish the club and seek to join the English national league pyramid system was developed by the Guernsey Football Association in an attempt to further advance development opportunities for the island's current and future players by playing at higher levels on a regular basis.

We are an independent, community amateur football club which play in the Isthmian South East Division at Step Four on English football's non-league pyramid system. The club is owned and run for the benefit of the local Guernsey community and it plays its home games at the Footes Lane Stadium.

The club's vision is to create, develop and maintain a sustainable, successful, financially viable, democratic football club that creates and maintains real and lasting benefits to its members and the local Guernsey community. We are a registered charity and will remain a non-profit organisation with any financial surpluses being re-invested for the future viability of the club and hence the benefit of the local community.

The initial idea to establish Guernsey FC was developed during the 2009-10 season when Guernsey's Senior County Division One representative side enjoyed a successful run in the FA National League System Cup (for league representative sides at Step Seven on the non-league pyramid system and below, since renamed the FA Inter-League Cup), culminating in Guernsey beating the Liverpool County Premier League 5-2 in the final in May 2010. Along the way, Guernsey defeated representative sides from the Kent County Premier League, the Northampton Premier League, the Southern Amateur League, the Hertfordshire Premier League and the Dorset Premier League. The final was held in Guernsey in front of a crowd of over 2,500 and was the first time ever that the FA had allowed one of its competition finals to be held outside of the UK mainland.

Following a 1-0 victory over Jersey to reclaim the Muratti Vase in May 2010, the prize for winning the FA National League System Cup for this same squad of players was to represent England in the UEFA Regions Cup preliminary round in Croatia in September 2010. This was a fantastic experience for the players and coaching and medical staff and, although Guernsey enjoyed mixed fortunes by beating Wales 3-0, drawing with hosts Croatia 1-1 and losing to group winners Turkey 3-0, it provided football at a higher standard, was very motivational and gave our players a great desire to improve further and to play more regularly at higher levels.

Over the course of the following few months, the club's founding directors, Steve Dewsnap and Mark Le Tissier, received encouragement from the Football Association, the Guernsey FA, the Combined Counties League (which we were introduced to by the FA), our former official main club sponsor Sportingbet, the island's government (the States of Guernsey) and the island's local football community to develop our plans for the new club further and were delighted when the member clubs of the Combined Counties League voted by a significant majority on 20 June 2011 to allow Guernsey FC to join Division One of their league.

The 2016-17 season was GFC's most challenging yet as they battled against relegation for the first time in their history. It took until the end of September to secure the first victory of the campaign and bad luck hit Tony Vance's squad with several lengthy injuries and absences to key players. They didn't manage to win a home game after Christmas, but finally ended their winless away run (that had gone on for over a year and nearly 30 matches) when they beat Chipstead in February and, ironically, it was their away results that kept them up as two more wins and a draw were enough to keep them ahead of their rivals. There was change off the field as Mark Le Tissier took over as Chairman, but the main highlight was the FA Cup coming to Guernsey for the first time in August amidst a tremendous fanfare that included the famous trophy being displayed at Footes Lane. Dave Rihoy's second-half brace in the first ever FA-Cup match to be contested outside the mainland secured a replay, but GFC eventually went out on penalties at Thamesmead Town. More youngsters made an impact as Thomas Dodds went on to become a key player having only made his debut at the start of the campaign at just 17 years of age. He went on to scoop five awards at the end-of-season gala.

The following two seasons saw the Green Lions in transition with a number of senior players reaching the end of their careers at this level and several new young players thrown in the deep end and having to learn the hard way. There were some tough moments and the wins weren't free-flowing, but the team was starting to develop a new resilient side that saw them grind out some important results against some top teams. 2017-18 was a slightly more comfortable 18th place out of 24 with safety secured with a few weeks to go, but the 2018-19 season went right to the wire. Tony Vance's side didn't win a game during the final three months of the season, but ground out enough points against the odds to keep them just ahead of Greenwich Borough. A re-shuffle of the Isthmian League saw a third division created at Step Four and Guernsey was part of a 20-team South East Division, which dropped to 19 when Thamesmead Town folded. That meant only one team would be relegated,

TRANMERE ROVERS 5 CHICHESTER CITY 1

It's over.

But what a remarkable FA Cup experience it's been for Chichester City – the first team in 70 years to make it to the second round of the world's oldest football knockout competition having begun their cup adventure in the extra-preliminary round.

In a run laced with the kind of fairy tale qualities that define the FA Cup, Chi battled through six rounds of qualifying to get to the 'proper' rounds, beating three opponents from the step above on the way.

There were other extraordinary pinch yourself moments for a club that was on the brink of bankruptcy 18 months ago – getting a unique bye into the second round and then hosting the draw for that stage of the competition with the BBC broadcasting live from Oaklands Park.

Mark Chapman hailed surfing striker Scott Jones "the best footballer I've ever interviewed" and footage of this went viral together with video of the Chichester players celebrating at Clacket Lane services after the win at Bowers & Pitsea. Over one million people viewed BBC South Today presenter Tony Husband's video of the reaction to the bye and millions more responded to the club's gesture on Twitter to donate some of the prize money to a Bury FC phoenix group.

The national press spoke to players and staff, there were radio interviews and a documentary was released about Chichester's cup journey.

It was the cup that kept giving but this all came to an end, for now at least, on Sunday 1st December when a second half hat-trick from Morgan Ferrier sandwiched between two Corey Blackett-Taylor goals crushed Chi cup dreams.

Ferrier had equalised for ten-men Tranmere in their first round replay with Wycombe Wanderers in what was a dramatic comeback win sealed by Rovers' Kieron Morris in extra-time and both Ferrier and Morris featured in manager Micky Mellon's line-up against Chichester, alongside most of the players that beat League One leaders Wycombe.

Miles Rutherford & Co made just one change to the starting XI last time out in the cup – Jones coming in for Matt Axell. Ahead of the game Chi boss Rutherford was concerned about the occasion overwhelming his side with players not getting as much of the ball as they'd like.

He need not have worried about that early doors – it was Roy of the Rovers stuff from the start as the visitors forged the first real chance of the game when Jones got on the end of a super cross from Josh Clack only to head wide of Scott Davies' left hand post with barely ten minutes on the clock.

Jones had almost got in earlier after a neat exchange between Gicu Iordache and Rob Hutchings and a cheeky Clack flick. Darren Potter's timely interception went out for a corner that Lloyd Rowlatt whipped in only for Davies to punch clear.

Ryan Davidson then fed a ball through towards Kaleem Haitham but it was too strong for Chi's top scorer. Rushian Hepburn-Murphy got a shot off on the turn for the hosts on 12 minutes after good work from Blackett-Taylor before Jones met a Rowlatt free-kick.

Dave Perkins' shot was charged down and City's keeper Steve Mowthorpe gathered a low cross from Jake Caprice. It wouldn't be the last time Caprice caused Chi problems. Next Corey Heath recovered brilliantly to deny the home side an opportunity and Iordache drove into the box at the other end only to lose control and concede a free-kick.

Tranmere, no strangers to the latter stages of the FA Cup having made the quarter finals in 2000, 2001 and 2004, were being matched by opponents some 100 odd places below them in the league pyramid. Captain Connor Cody and Ferrier were involved in a number of duels and Cody did well mid-way through the half to divert a Morris effort for a corner.

Then on 32 minutes Blackett-Taylor clipped the bar with a fierce drive before Morris tried his luck from distance. Mowthorpe gathered this easily enough and then pulled off an excellent save tipping Hepburn-Murphy's effort over to ensure it was level at the break.

The last, and until now, only time, a Chichester side made it to the 'proper' rounds of the competition was six decades ago. Then Chi trailed Bristol City 8-0 at the interval but here they were having a real go.

Tranmere brought on Connor Jennings for Hepburn-Murphy. It was Jennings' goal in the last minute of extra-time in the League Two play-off final at Wembley in May that helped Rovers to a successive promotion.

And Jennings was soon in the thick of it and Chi had defending to do. Davidson cleared a Morris cross and then made an excellent challenge on Ferrier.

Blackett-Taylor had an effort blocked as the home side pressed and then headed straight into Mowthorpe's arms. A long range attempt from Lordache popped up off the surface and gave Davies something to think about before Horncastle picked up the first yellow card of the game when he impeded Ferrier.

And then with Cody off receiving treatment Ferrier headed a Caprice cross against the woodwork. Blackett-Taylor was first to the rebound and steered the ball into the back of the net. It was 2-0 two minutes later when a mistake at the back let Ferrier in for his first of the day – a composed finish. Haitham's shot on 65 minutes was to be his last involvement of the game as Rutherford changed it up bringing on Axell into midfield.

Ferrier forced a smart save out of Mowthorpe before Chi were undone by route one and another mix-up that allowed Ferrier to grab his second with a clever lob.



TMoments later Mowthorpe was called on once more denying Morris who cracked one with his left foot. Ferrier then completed an 11minute hat-trick turning in Caprice's delivery.

Cody was replaced by Ryan Peake with 15 to go and Paul Mullin came on for Ferrier who left the field to a standing ovation from the Rovers fans.

Horncastle's speculative effort was wide of the mark and a nice piece of skill from lordache got him away but he tried to do too much and the move broke down. And then Chichester, separated by five tiers of English football from Tranmere, were five goals adrift when Blackett-Taylor turned in another cross from Caprice on 85 minutes.

Blackett-Taylor might have been the second Rovers hat-trick hero after a Mowthorpe mistake but the Chi shot-stopper redeemed himself with a fine save. Mullin blasted one over before another history making moment in this cup run when Peake, an 88-1 outside bet to score, glanced in a corner in the last minute of normal time in front of the away supporters.

The Chi fans went nuts.

Inflatables – a cow, a palm tree, a beachball or two bounced around between the 450 City supporters who burst into a rendition of "Let's all have a disco" and the players all raced to celebrate with the club's first ever scorer of a 'proper' round goal.

The fans hung around for as long as they could after Darren Drysdale blew the final whistle to applaud the team before heading towards the coaches and a long drive back to Sussex. Plaudits poured in from the football world for the Chichester players, management and staff.

Phil Annets of FA Fact File commented on Twitter, "Bad luck today guys, but everyone involved with the club can be mightily proud of your FA Cup achievements this season", Bognor Regis Town FC tweeted "Great effort, you should be proud, well done!" and a Tranmere supporter added, "Credit to you. Gave us a good game".

The FA Cup run has been an amazing experience for the unsung heroes at Chi who work tirelessly day to day behind the scenes from the kitman to the groundsman, to the physios and those on the committee.

Wayne Dalton, the Chichester City secretary, who occupied this role at Rutherford's former club Moneyfields for a number of years said, "I've been a secretary for 10 years now. This is the furthest I've got in the cup and it's probably the furthest I'll ever get. It's a tough job being the secretary of a football club but this is the most enjoyment I've had as a secretary. Watching the players train at St George's Park on the way up to Tranmere was amazing."

There aren't many Tier 8 football clubs that can say they've had an impromptu committee meeting at 3:30am in a hotel bar before a second round FA Cup match.

"The people at the club in the background had a few drinks together the night before the game. It was a fantastic night. We've labelled it as a committee meeting. We had breakfast on the day of the game. I wasn't nervous. It was a great day and to score a goal in front of your own fans was something else" he added.

Dalton clearly has a special relationship with Rutherford and his No2 Graeme Gee. “They’re two people I’m very fond of that I’ve known for the past fifteen years either playing or supporting them as a secretary. They are fantastic.

“We’ve got to concentrate on the league now. If the players respect what they’ve done in the FA Cup then this club can go a lot higher. It’s in the players’ hands. As a committee we’re looking ahead to next season and our next journey. It’s a round the clock job. You don’t stop being a secretary for one minute.”

Colin Mills (Physio)

Colin Mills, one of the physios at Chichester said, “We haven’t won a game in the FA Cup for four years but I’m very lucky now. This club has got a bit of class about it. Chichester is a unique club. Everybody is as one. There aren’t many clubs where the chairman cuts the pitch and the manager drives the team bus. My other half works behind the bar and my daughter-in-law does too. I do it because I love football. We’ve got a great tie up with the university with other physios working at the club.

“You can’t get better than today. The Tranmere hospitality was superb. But we’ve got to get our feet back on the ground quickly. Who would have thought last year after winning the county league we’d be at Tranmere Rovers? Probably no one. The whole journey’s been fantastic.”

Malcolm Harwood (Groundsman)

Malcolm Harwood, helps chairman Andy Bell in his other role as groundsman. He’s been involved at the club on and off the pitch for over twenty years, first as a player in the late 80s then as a player-manager with Chi stalwart Dave Kelly before working more recently as a groundsman and committee member. Harwood said, “Having played for such a long time I appreciated there were always people behind the scenes who everybody seemed to overlook, but without those people I wouldn’t have been able to play. I wouldn’t have had a pitch to play on and we wouldn’t have had decent kit to play in. My thinking was I’ve had a very long playing career – I didn’t stop playing until I was 51, so I wanted to give something back to the next generation of footballers. That’s what I’m trying to do. I love Chichester City. It’s always been my spiritual football home.

“The cup run is the pinnacle of my involvement in football. It’s been some journey. The success is great for the club and will sustain us for two, three, four years. We need to learn from past experiences at our club though. Two years ago we nearly didn’t have a club.”

Ian Madgwick (Kitman)

Chi's kitman Ian Madgwick is another key figure at the club who has turned his hand to most things at Oaklands Park. Madgwick, who played for Portfield not Chi, says he got hooked on City

when he was asked to volunteer for the committee. Like others, he wanted to put something back into the club.

Madgwick said the cup run might mean more people come forward to help out at Oaklands Park.

He said, "I love being involved with the club. When I first started doing the kit there were Under 18s, reserves and first teams playing mid-week and Saturdays and Sundays. It was hard work to be honest.

"Being part of this journey has been very emotional for me. When the team coach pulled up to Tranmere's ground and we saw all the supporters there it choked me up. A lot of the guys were emotional. I'm very proud of the club."

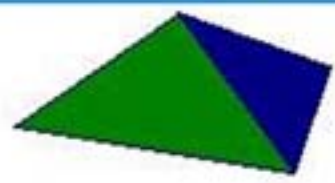

From The Pilot Field

There won't have been many people back in August who would have imagined Chi heading into December unbeaten away from home in the Isthmian south east division but they travelled to league leaders Hastings United having done just that in the club's first ever season at Step 4 of the non-league football pyramid. Four first half goals in a 30 minute spell the hosts dominated and a penalty after the interval did for that record as the East Sussex side demonstrated their title credentials and condemned Chi to a third successive defeat in all competitions.

Striker Scott Jones returned to the starting XI having missed the mid-week Sussex Senior Cup loss to Lewes; as did defender Ryan Davidson; with captain Connor Cody partnering fellow centre back Corey Heath.

Pilot Field has been a happy hunting ground for Hastings this term - they are yet to drop any points at home, and the U's, playing in front of their biggest crowd of the campaign, started with intensity.

Keeper Steve Mowthorpe had to have his wits about him as early as the third minute to clear when Hastings hot-shot Davide Rodari threatened to get in. Dan Ajakaiye gave Davidson work to do regularly with his probing runs.

The visitors' back four did well to crowd out Ajakaiye and skipper Sam Adams as the pair linked up nicely and then Davidson made a timely interception to turn the ball out for the first corner of the game.

This came to nothing but Hastings went ahead in the eighth minute through a composed Rodari finish. The Italian-born forward, a product of Inter Milan's youth set-up, is scoring goals for fun at present and grabbed eight in the extraordinary 12-3 Velocity Trophy win over East Grinstead a week or so ago.

Chi were under the cosh and Adams doubled the hosts' lead in the 18th minute, steering in Jake Elliott's cross after the right back beat Jones in a foot race.

Josh Clack then had an effort charged down when Hastings conceded a rare corner. It was 3-0 at the midpoint. Chichester failed to clear their lines and Ajakaiye made the most of things cracking in a super drive off the woodwork.

Heath hooked away a dangerous delivery before Jones might have pulled one back on the half hour mark with a bullet header but for Louis Rogers acrobatic tip-over.

Rodari was at it again five minutes before the break with another decent finish after Lanre Azeez threaded through a slide rule pass.

The away side have shown their mettle recently against Tranmere and Lewes and did anything but capitulate in the second half.

Matt Axell swung in a 47th minute corner that Jones nodded into the box and there was Heath to grab Chi an unlikely life-line with a close range header.

Adams and Rodari caused havoc in the next attack with the U's leading scorer impeded in the penalty box. Ryan Worrall stepped up and coolly slotted his spot-kick beyond Mowthorpe.

Jones then had an attempt blocked before a burst of pace from Ajakaiye sent him away only to toe-poke the ball wide of the post. With the hour approaching Azeez charged into the box but his cross was dealt with comfortably enough. Rodari outfoxed Heath next only for his shot to nick off a defender for a corner that Jones headed away.

Ajakaiye fired one off target, Davidson somehow managed to fend off Rodari and get the ball back to Mowthorpe and Heath had another go with a header.

Both teams made changes. Rodari, looking for another hat-trick, was replaced by Ben Pope and James Pool and Sam Beale came on for Adam Lovatt and Elliot.

Chichester brought on Theo Bennetts and George Cody for Axell and Kaleem Haitham.

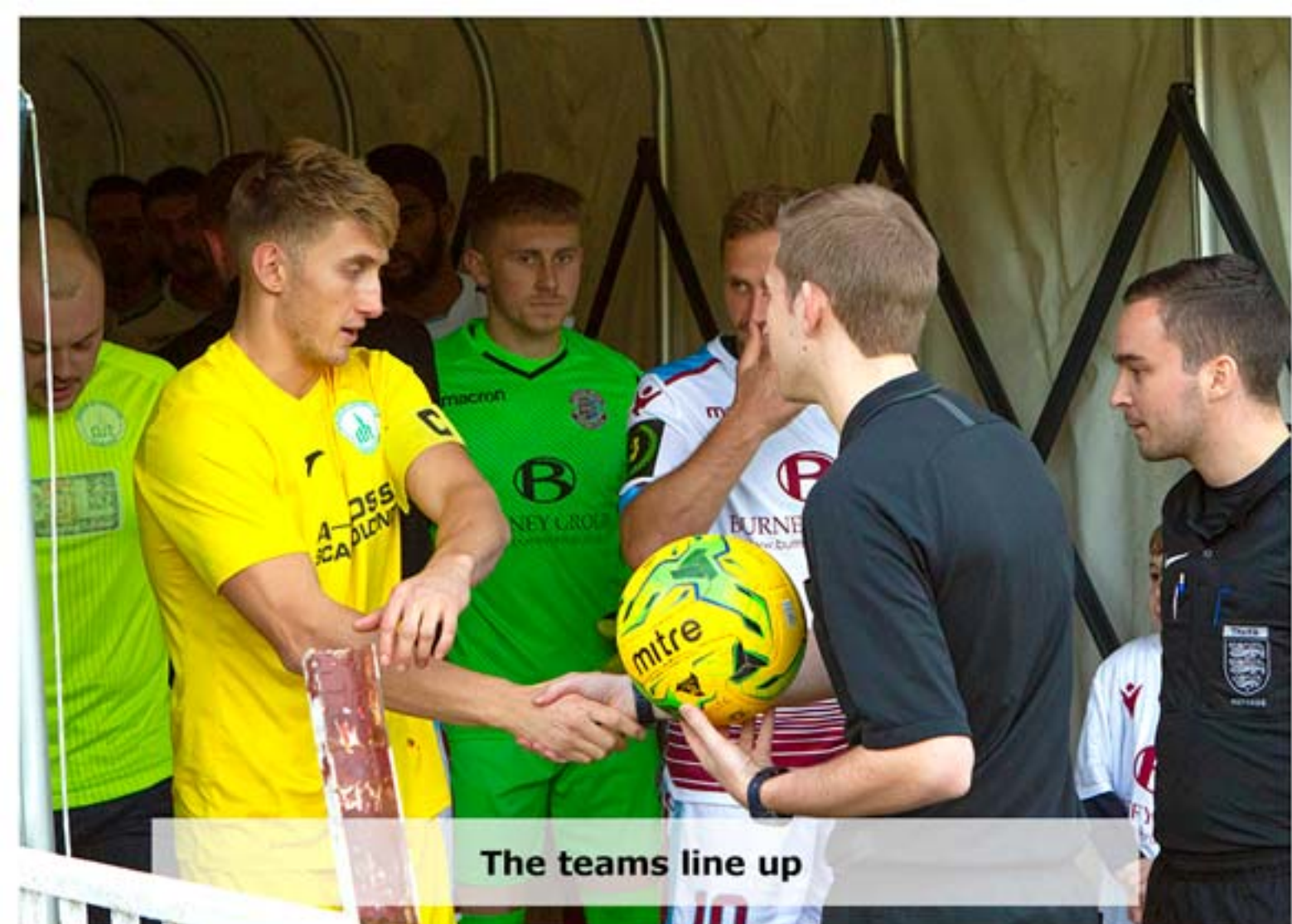
In the last 15 minutes Jones tried a shot on the turn and Clack drew a fine stop out of Rogers.

Referee Joe McKay gave Adams a stiff talking to for a tackle on Rowlatt and then brandished a yellow card as the U's captain fouled the same Chi player moments later.

Clack dragged an effort wide, Davidson tried his luck from outside the box but couldn't keep the ball down and Rogers got his body behind a fierce attempt from George Cody in time added on.

It was Chi's first loss in the league since a 1-0 defeat to Three Bridges at home in September.
